

A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE CCS MANUAL

1949: FIRST ENGLISH-LANGUAGE EDITION (LOOSE TYPESCRIPT PAGES)

Protzman and Sarasohn prepare typescript lectures notes in English for the first CCS Seminar, which takes place in Tokyo.

There is no copy of this edition in the Hopper Archives.

1950: SECOND ENGLISH-LANGUAGE EDITION (BOUND TYPESCRIPT PAGES)

Protzman and Sarasohn prepare a revised edition of the Manual for the second CCS Seminar, which takes place in Osaka. The title page reads:

*Fundamentals of Industrial Management:
A Textbook for the Communications Manufacturing Industry of Japan
by
Charles A. Protzman and
Homer M. Sarasohn.*

*Civil Communications Section,
General Headquarters
Supreme Headquarters for the Allied Powers*

Tokyo, Japan, January 1950.

1950-52: THIRD ENGLISH-LANGUAGE EDITION (BOUND TYPESCRIPT PAGES)

B. Inoue prepares a new version based on the second English-language edition, but including additional material sent to him by Protzman from the US. The title page reads:

*CCS
Industrial Management
1949*

The authors of the manual are not listed or mentioned. The date '1949' presumably reflects the fact that the original CCS Seminar took place in that year.

This version is not given any circulation but is important because it provides the basis for all subsequent versions in both languages. There are copies in the Baker Library at Harvard Business School and in the Hopper Archives.

1952: FIRST JAPANESE-LANGUAGE EDITION (PRINTED BOOK)

B. Inoue and T. Kato translate the Manual into Japanese and arrange for it to be published by the Diamond Press, Tokyo.

SECOND JAPANESE-LANGUAGE EDITION (PRINTED BOOK)

1993: Matsushita Electric republishes the Diamond Press version in an elaborate Japanese-language edition. There are preface by M. Matsushita (in Japanese) and by H. Sarasohn (in English).

FOURTH ENGLISH-LANGUAGE EDITION (ELECTRONIC BOOK)

1998: Nicholas Fisher prepares a new edition, to which Sarasohn makes some additions and corrections. The title page reads:

*The Fundamentals of Industrial Management:
CCS Management Course*

*Homer M. Sarasohn
Charles A. Protzman*

*Civil Communications Section
GHQ, SCAP*

A new preface by Sarasohn refers to Kenneth Hopper and Myron Trbus as 'very special people' who had given 'new life' to the historical record of the CCS Seminar.
